2021 Predictions Revisited

For 2021, physicians predicted...

- Drug affordability, treatment access, and physician burnout would be the top three issues to prioritize
- The US would find it difficult to achieve COVID-19 herd immunity
- Accelerations in health-tech expected to drive improvements in care but posed significant data and privacy risks
- European physicians were focused on the need for more drug innovation and healthcare research funding
- Both US and European physicians predicted strong success with COVID vaccine and were optimistic about returning to normal
- Widespread vaccine roll-out, both US and European physicians noting as the top critical need
- The toll on healthcare providers would be significant due to pandemic, with a third already experiencing pervasive loss and 47% enduring some form of burnout


2022 Survey Details

- Method: 7-Minute Survey
- Crowd: US & European Physicians (Mainly PCP, Oncs, Rheums, Neuros, Cards, and Others)
- **Fielding Period:** January 1-2, 2022 (closed under 10 hours)



Findings

Hopes for Pharma Industry in 2022

Though lower patient costs is still by far the top aspiration, in 2022 US physicians have more demands for pharma with COVID treatments and vaccines surpassing some perennial hopes.

Predictions for Pharma Industry in 2022

Consistent with last year, more than anything else (32%), physicians believe nothing will change. Those who do envision change see drug prices rising (18%), new drug approvals (13%), and an increase in COVID-focused treatments (9%).

Hopes for Healthcare Industry in 2022

Q1a

What important changes would you most like to see in the healthcare industry in 2022?



Both American and European physicians would like to see more telemedicine in healthcare as their top priority in **2022**, innovation in the space, remote monitoring, and reimbursement for US doctors.

In **2021**, more than half (51%) of US respondents were hoping for better cost of care for patients, and European physicians' top ask was for a return to normalcy (17%).

This is the first year that we've seen the change that most physicians would like to see happen in healthcare, align with the change most respondents believe will happen (after no changes).

Telemedicine tops both the hopes and predictions lists for US and European respondents in 2022, with 19% of US physicians and 25% of European physicians predicting its expansion and evolution in 2022.

Endemic or Not?

COVID-19 is endemic, according to **76%** of **all 442 physicians** surveyed. **Seventy-three percent of US** and 79% of European physicians surveyed believe COVID is now endemic. The most optimistic nations were France and Spain, with 33% and 31% respectively believing we would get back to a pre-pandemic world. Germany (88%) and Italy (86%) had the strongest agreement with COVID now being endemic.

US & European Vaccine Views

Assuming COVID-19 is endemic, **84%** of all respondents surveyed worldwide, believe the COVID-19 vaccine will become a part of the childhood vaccine schedule. Eight-six percent of US and 83% of European physicians reported as such. With nearly **one in three** in the UK believing it will **not be part** of the **schedule**.



Perceived Importance of Industry Changes

Making therapies more affordable dropped significantly as a priority in the last year, as did improving wider access to available therapies, with addressing burnout rising as a priority.







Likelihood of Occurrences 1/2

Though American and European physicians have strong commonality in what they think is likely for 2022, significantly more US physicians believe it's likely that they will command more leverage for compensation in 2022 and that the year will see more patient resistance to vaccines and COVID-related treatments as misinformation escalates.

Agreement Statements

Nearly twice as many US physicians (45%) are reporting burnout compared to their European counterparts (25%). While more than half of US respondents have concerns over the long-term impact of COVID on patients, just over a third in Europe share this concern.






Agreement Statements

Though the US physician burnout reporting is consistent from 2021 to 2022, nearly twice as many US physicians note having considered leaving medicine since the start of the pandemic from 2021 to 2022.







Key Takeaways
